



Hazardous Waste Drop Off & Paper-Shredding Event Saturday, October 19, 2019 (Anaheim Hills)

Over 160 cars rolled up to drop off their hazardous household materials at Supervisor Wagner's sponsored e-waste event. The Anaheim Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center (HHWCC) received a total of 7,245 pounds of hazardous waste and 4,550 of electronic waste on Saturday, October 19th.

People dropped off piles of papers for shredding (think personal documents full of information one could use for identity theft). Team Wagner helped hand out free battery buckets so people could dispose of their batteries properly.

5 Latex Fbin: 3750 Pounds

4 Flam Solid Boxes: 800 Pounds

1 Fbin Aerosols: 475 Pounds

9 Flam Liquid: 1620 Pounds

3 Flam Liquid (Pesticides): 600 Pounds

NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG **TAKE BACK DAY**

Saturday, Oct. 26, 2019

Please consider safely removing unused or expired medication this Saturday. Residents have the opportunity to drop them off at collection sites to eliminate the potential for misuse, abuse, or accidental poisoning. Improper disposal of medications, such as flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash, can be hazardous to public safety, public health, and the environment.

Collection Sites:

Irvine Police Department, 1 Civic Center Plaza, in the parking lot

Kaiser Permanente Irvine Medical Center, 6670 Alton Parkway, near the Alton/Sand Canyon Medical Office Building 1

Hoag Health Center, 16405 Sand Canyon

Irvine Valley College, 5500 Irvine Center Drive, Parking Lot 5

If you are trying to break an addictive habit, or want to prevent any curious teens from finding old prescriptions in the medicine cabinet, this is a chance to create a drug-free environment in your home. Drug addiction has become an epidemic in Orange County. Opioid usage alone has reached epic proportions, and many people innocently got their start from a once much-needed prescription. People who become dependent on painkillers may escalate their addiction to seeking stronger drugs, such as fentanyl.

The Orange County Sheriff's Department (OCSD) has seen an increase in seizures of fentanyl thus far in 2019, with one recent seizure equaling almost half of the total amount of fentanyl seized in the entire year of 2018.

According to OCSC, Illicit fentanyl that is sold on the street started to emerge locally in 2017. In 2019, teams have seized more than 100 pounds of confirmed fentanyl, more than doubling from 2018 totals with two and a half months left in the year. The

increase in the presence of fentanyl has had deadly consequences. According to the California Department of Health, statewide fentanyl deaths increased 614% from 2014 to 2018.

Orange County fentanyl deaths jumped by 564% from 14 in 2014 to 93 in 2018.

Supervisor Wagner is dedicated to public safety and wants to encourage all residents to safely dispose of unused medications. If you are struggling with a pill addiction, there are resources available to you.

When breast cancer is detected early (and is in the localized stage) the odds are quite favorable with a 5-year relative survival rate of 100%.

Whether it's breast cancer or other diseases, Supervisor Wagner encourages everyone to step up and take action; for instance, September was National Pediatric Cancer Awareness Month and our office connected with families who are advocating for more research funding. 
